






A Public Health Approach

Promote the use of a scientific knowledge base in policy and decision making

Ensure provision of services to those in need

Individual


Knowledge, attitudes, beliefs

A range of **personal**, **social**, **economic** and **environmental** factors that influence health status.


- Age, sex & constitutional factors

Social Determinants of Health (SDOH)

Conditions in the places where people **live**, **learn**, **work**, **worship**, and **play** affect a wide range of health risks and outcomes.
