



## **Report on the OVC Fiscal Year 2021 Crime Victims Fund Tribal Set-Aside Formula Program**

### **INTRODUCTION**

The Department of Justice (the Department) and the Biden Administration have a long-standing commitment to improve services for victims of crime in American Indian and Alaska Native communities. On January 13 and January 14, 2022, the Department will consult with tribal leaders about “tribal set-aside” funding administered by the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC) from the Crime Victims Fund (CVF). Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the Consultations will be held virtually using a video and telephone conferencing platform. The Department presents this paper to help educate Consultation participants about the history of OVC’s tribal set-aside, and inform them about how the funds were used in Fiscal Year (FY) 2021.

OVC’s Tribal Division administers the Tribal Victim Services Set-Aside Formula grant program (TVSSA Program), and OVC’s other tribal-specific grant programs.

### **HISTORY OF THE OVC TRIBAL SET-ASIDE PROGRAM**

#### **FY 2018-2019: Competitive Award Process**

A 1988 amendment to the Victims of Crime Act of 1984 (VOCA) created the Office for Victims of Crime as part of the Department’s Office of Justice Programs. An important part of OVC’s mission is to administer grant awards that are funded by the Crime Victims Fund (CVF), which primarily includes criminal fines paid by persons convicted in federal courts. Each year Congress authorizes OVC to use the CVF to support grant programs for victim services. In the FY 2018 budget, for the first time Congress created a tribal victim services set-aside from the CVF. The amount of the first set-aside was 3 percent, and accordingly, the set-aside totaled about \$133 million, that was “available to the Office for Victims of Crime for grants, consistent with the requirements of the Victims of Crime Act, to Indian tribes to improve services for victims of crime.” In the FY 2019 budget, Congress authorized a tribal set-aside of \$167.65 million (5 percent), for the same purposes. OVC distributed the FY 2018 and FY 2019 set-asides as competitive discretionary grant award programs with a 36-month project period to all eligible applicants, which included federally recognized Indian tribal governments, legal entities acting as the authorized designees of federally recognized Indian tribes, and tribal consortia made-up of two or more federally recognized Indian tribes.

## **FY 2020: Introduction of the Tribal Set-Aside Formula**

Congress authorized a 3 percent tribal set-aside for FY 2020 as part of OVC's CVF receipts resulting in a total of \$132.05 million for distribution to eligible applicants. Based on feedback received from tribal leaders and representatives at prior tribal consultations and Federal Advisory Committee meetings, OVC collaborated with the Bureau of Justice Statistics to create an interim, population-based formula to distribute the set-aside funds for FY 2020. (See Appendix A for a flow chart, which outlines the formula allocation process.) OVC introduced a noncompetitive two-phase application process in FY 2020. In phase one, all eligible applicants were required to submit a declaration of the size of the population that would be served by its proposed project. OVC used the data included in these declarations to distribute the available set-aside funds among all eligible applicants who submitted a timely declaration. OVC then informed each Phase 1 applicant about their total share of the formula allocation for FY 2020, and invited them to submit a full application, including a program narrative and budget. OVC permitted each Phase 2 applicant the flexibility to select their own award period of 12–60 months.

Some applicants participated in Phase 1 but not Phase 2, and some Phase 2 applicants submitted applications that totaled less than their formula allocation amount. OVC ultimately made 133 awards totaling \$112.6 million to eligible applicants under the FY 2020 TVSSA Program. OVC redistributed the unclaimed set-aside funds totaling \$5.5 million to other eligible tribal governments and organizations who submitted applications for funding to OVC's other FY 2020 discretionary grant programs.

## **FY 2021 TRIBAL SET-ASIDE RESULTS**

As part of the FY 2021 budget for the U.S. DOJ, Congress authorized OVC to create a 3 percent tribal set-aside from its CVF receipts, resulting in a total of \$100,750,000 to help support the TVSSA Program. Based on the input that OVC received from tribal leaders at its November 2020 tribal consultation, OVC again used a noncompetitive, formula-based, two-phase application process to allocate the FY 2021 tribal set-aside. As in previous FYs, OVC invited all federally recognized tribes to apply for the program, regardless of whether they received funding in the past, and regardless of the unobligated (unexpended) balance or time remaining in the award period for their previous tribal set-aside awards.

On February 5, 2021 OVC invited all eligible applicants to submit a population certificate by March 5, 2021 as part of Phase 1 of the application process. In the 30-day interim period between issuing the invitation and the certificate submission deadline, OVC hosted three webinars to provide an overview of the program and technical assistance to potential applicants on how to complete and submit the required population certificate, on February 10, February 17, and February 24, 2021. OVC enlisted the assistance of multiple agencies and organizations to promote these webinars to tribes, including the Office on Violence Against Women, the Office of Tribal Justice, and its tribal training and technical assistance providers. OVC received 173 population certificates from eligible applicants at the close of Phase 1 of the FY 2021 application process, and applied the same formula that was used in FY 2020 to allocate the funds available for FY 2021 TVSSA Program awards among all 173 Phase 1 applicants. On April 9, 2021 OVC sent a letter and a list of the FY 2021 formula allocation amounts all 173 Phase 1 applicants,

inviting them to participate in Phase 2 of the application process. (See Appendix B for a list of the FY 2021 TVSSA Program allocations.) Applicants were once again required to submit a program narrative and budget, and offered the flexibility to choose their own award period between 12–60 months as part of Phase 2. OVC notified applicants that they had to submit their complete application in the Department’s online JustGrants system by no later than June 14, 2021. OVC staff hosted a webinar on April 26, 2021 to provide guidance and technical assistance to Phase 2 applicants on the application requirements and submission process and to answer their questions. OVC posted the webinar recording, presentation materials, and transcript on its Website.

### **FY 2021 Changes to the TVSSA Program Application Process**

As part of the November 2020 tribal consultation, OVC received feedback from tribal leaders about how it might make the application process less cumbersome for TVSSA Program applicants. In response to that input, OVC offered FY 2021 TVSSA Program applicants the opportunity to choose from two alternative options to submitting a traditional program narrative that is typically 20 pages in length. In lieu of submitting a traditional program narrative, applicants could either: (1) complete a program checklist on their own; or (2) schedule an interview with an OVC staff member and have the OVC staff member complete the checklist for them.

By June 14, 2021, OVC had received notice from a few Phase 1 applicants that they wished to withdraw their FY 2021 TVSSA Program application, and only 76 of the Phase 1 applicants had completed the Phase 2 application process. OVC extended the Phase 2 submission process by an additional 30 days to July 14, 2021. OVC staff and its tribal training and technical assistance providers used the period of extension to conduct an intensive outreach campaign for the roughly 95 Phase 1 applicants who had either not notified OVC of their intention to withdraw their application, or had not completed the Phase 2 application process by the original June 14, 2021 submission deadline. While many of the Phase 1 applicants indicated a desire to complete the Phase 2 application process when they were contacted by OVC staff or OVC’s tribal training and technical assistance providers, other Phase 1 applicants confirmed that they were not interested in completing Phase 2. Some applicants did not respond to OVC’s outreach efforts.

OVC staff and its tribal training and technical assistance providers supported those Phase 2 applicants who were interested in completing the process with overcoming the barriers that were impeding their progress (e.g., technical problems with using the JustGrants system). However, as the July 14, 2021 deadline approached, OVC was aware that it would likely not have enough applications from Tribes to fully obligate the TVSSA Program funds by the end of the federal FY on September 30, 2021. On July 13, 2021, OVC announced that it would host a tribal consultation on July 29, 2021 from 3:00 p.m.–5:00 p.m., EDT to solicit input from tribal leaders on how OVC should allocate the unobligated TVSSA Program funds for FY 2021. Based on the recommendations received from tribal leaders during that consultation, OVC decided to adopt a policy of re-allocating any unobligated TVSSA Program funds to eligible applicants who completed Phase 2 of the application process.

OVC applied the same formula it used to generate the initial formula allocation amounts to the unobligated balance of \$11,236,255, which resulted in an increase in funding ranging from

\$1,599 to \$775,044 for all 142 applicants who completed Phase 2 of the application process. (See Revised FY 2021 Formula Allocation Chart in Appendix B.) In addition, OVC allocated \$2,027,331 in unobligated funds to help support the expansion of victim services resources for two tribes who have been impacted by the U.S. Supreme Court's *McGirt* decision.

Outside the formula grant process, OVC uses set-aside funds to support Tribes through its tribal training and technical assistance program, and also obligated funds to support other OVC Indian country programs, projects and initiatives, including the Department's Coordinated Tribal Assistance Solicitation Purpose Area<sup>2</sup>, the Tribal Resource Mapping Project, OVC's tribal training and technical assistance program, the 2022 National Indian Nations Conference, and other Department priorities, including the Tribal Access Project, which expands tribal access to the FBI's criminal records history databases. (See Appendix C for a full list of other Indian country awards, programs, and initiatives supported with FY 2021 TVSSA funds).

### **ANTICIPATING THE FY 2022 TRIBAL SET-ASIDE**

Because Congress has not yet passed an FY 2022 appropriations bill for the Department, for planning purposes, OVC is assuming that Congress will again carve out a set-aside for tribes as part of its annual allocation of Crime Victims Fund receipts in FY 2022, and that the set-aside will be comparable in amount and requirements to the set-asides from previous Fiscal Years. OVC is proposing to retain many of the same features that have come to define the program over the last two FYs including:

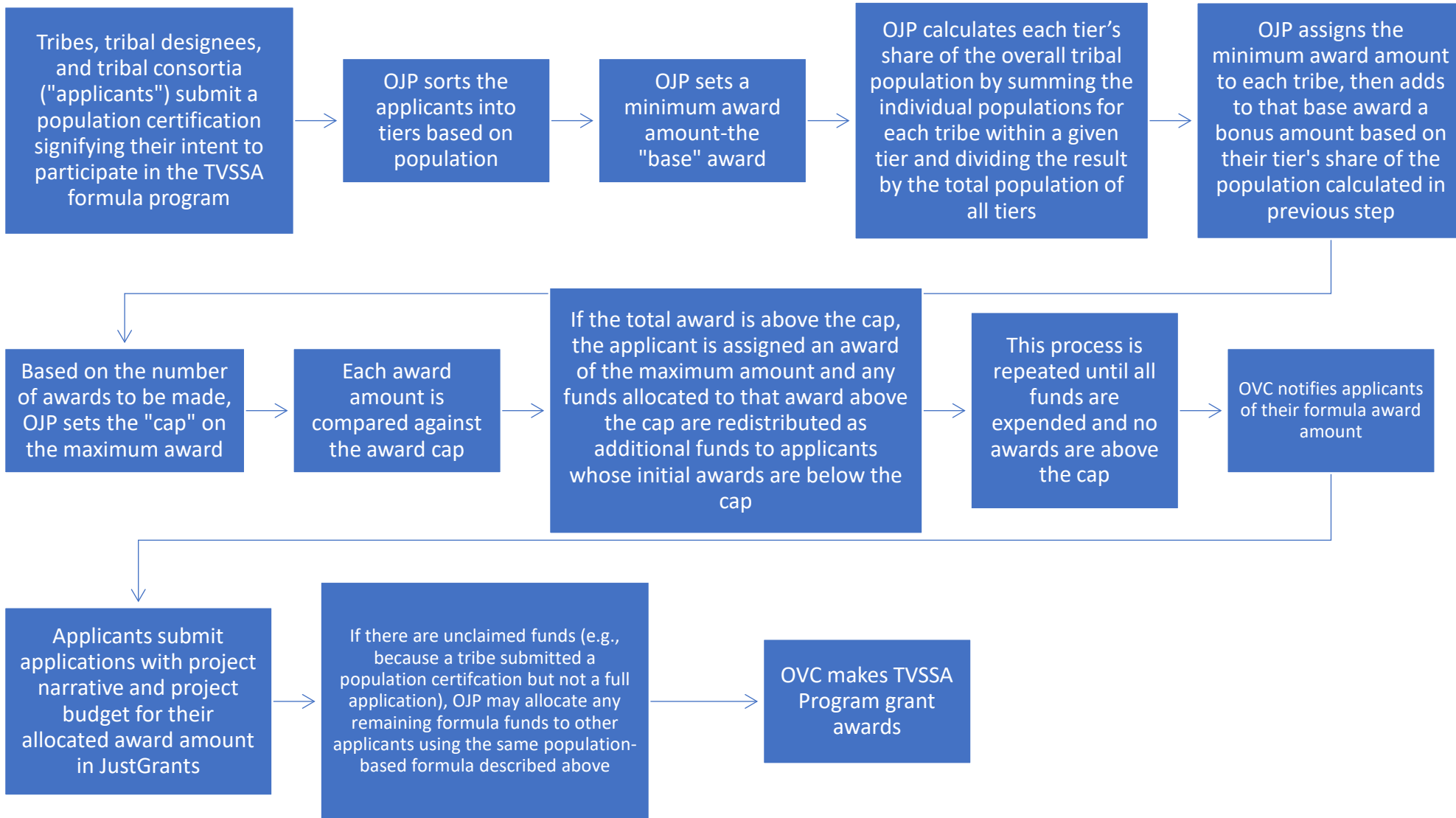
- Awarding TVSSA funds using a noncompetitive application process that allocates the funds based on the total number of applicants and the population to be served by each applicant's proposed project.
- Using a two-phase application process, which requires all interested and eligible applicants to submit a population certificate as part of Phase 1, and a program narrative and budget as part of Phase 2.
- Continuing to provide applicants flexibility in the application process, including selecting their own award period between 12–60 months, and choosing to submit a program checklist or participate in an interview with OVC staff instead of writing a traditional program narrative.
- Allocating any unobligated/unclaimed TVSSA funds to applicants who complete Phase 2 of the application process, and/or tribal applicants to other OVC discretionary programs so that the funds are not at risk of being de-obligated and returned to the CVF.

In addition to this report, OVC has issued a framing paper, which outlines two issues for discussion at the FY 2022 consultation:

1. proposed changes to the permissible use of set-aside funds to include using the funds for construction; and
2. possible enhancements to the set-aside application process for federal FY 2022.

## Revised FY 2021 OVC TVSSA Program Formula Allocations

The table below details how OVC distributed the bulk of the \$11,236,255 in funds—that the 31 applicants declined by not completing Phase 2 of the application process—to the 142 applicants who completed Phase 2 of the FY 2021 TVSSA Program application process. OVC applied the TVSSA formula to \$8,999,894 and redistributed those funds to the 142 applicants who completed Phase 2. OVC also distributed \$2,027,331 to the tribes who were impacted by the *McGirt* decision, and requested additional funds to expand their victim services programs. The balance of the left-over funds were used to help support other OVC projects, programs, and initiatives, and Department’s Indian country priorities. The “Total Award Amount” reflects the applicant’s final award amount following their receipt of the additional allocations and/or supplement. Please note that some grantees declined the full amount of TVSSA Program funds that OVC offered to them. The “Final Award Amount” reflects the total amount of award funds that the grantee elected to receive. The funds that these grantees declined were used to support other tribal projects in FY 2021.
