Resolution No. USET 2000:28

RECOGNITION OF THE YEAR 2000 AS THE YEAR OF THE AMERICAN INDIAN WOMAN AND THE REMOVAL OF ANY TERMS CONSIDERED DEROGATORY AND OFFENSIVE TO AMERICAN INDIAN WOMEN

- WHEREAS, United South and Eastern Tribes, Incorporated (USET) is an intertribal organization comprising twenty-three (23) federally recognized tribes; and
- **WHEREAS,** the actions taken by the USET Board of Directors officially represent the intentions of each member tribe, as the Board of Directors comprises delegates from the member tribes' leadership; and
- WHEREAS, we recognize our existence is based on the strength and well-being of our American Indian Women; and
- WHEREAS, our culture and heritage acknowledges American Indian Women as the cohesive force that is the foundation of family relationships and community alliances; and
- WHEREAS, American Indian Women are the givers of life and their well-being including mental, physical, emotional, and spirituality determines the direction of the next seven generations; therefore, be it
- **RESOLVED**, the USET Board of Directors declares the year 2000 as the Year of the American Indian Woman and we request that all states and the federal government recognize our declarations; be it further
- **RESOLVED**, the USET Board of Directors requests that all state and the federal governments respect our American Indian Women and stop the use of any terms considered demoralizing, dehumanizing, and offensive, which for hundreds of years have been used to subjugate and dismantle the fibers of a healthy American Indian family and society.

Therefore; we the Wabanaki Native Governments and communities, declare the Year 2000 as the Year of the Native Women and we request the State of Maine and the Federal government to recognize our declaration, and
