USET Resolution No. 2004:007

STATE OF FLORIDA CONDEMNATION LAWSUIT AGAINST THE MICCOSUKEE TRIBE OF INDIANS OF FLORIDA

WHEREAS, United South and Eastern Tribes, Incorporated (USET) is an intertribal organization comprised of twenty-four (24) federally recognized tribes; and

WHEREAS, the actions taken by the USET Board of Directors officially represent the intentions of each member tribe, as the Board of Directors comprises delegates from the member tribes' leadership; and

WHEREAS, the Miccosukee Tribe of Indians of Florida has fee land as part of its tribal land base located in eastern Collier County, Florida, totaling 800 plus acres for the purposes of providing Tribal Members a place to harvest cypress and palm fronds for traditional chickee building and other plants for medicinal purposes as well as a potential place for hunting for subsistence; and

WHEREAS, the Miccosukee Tribe had an archaeological consultant conduct a cultural resources survey on this property whereby the consultant found a cultural resources site that is potentially eligible for listing in the National Registry of Historic Places, but requires further survey work; and

whereas, this land lies in an area that is slated for hydrologic restoration by the State of Florida as past of the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan called the Southern Golden Estates Hydrologic Restoration Plan ("Restoration Plan") whose goal is to restore a failed housing development to a more natural state by removing roads, filling in canals, and pumping water into the area with the main objective to provide fresh water sheet flow into the 10,000 islands area of the Everglades and Southwest Florida; and

WHEREAS, the State of Florida attempted to enter into a flowage easement agreement with the Miccosukee Tribe which would allow the State to unconditionally flood the land with no guarantees of water quality or quantity; and

whereas, the land is not located within the actual construction footprint of the Restoration Plan, has a cultural resources site located on it which would better be protected under Tribal jurisdiction, is already in a natural state, thus requiring no restoration, and is not necessary to reach the overall goal of providing fresh water sheet flow as stated above; and

whereas, the State of Florida entered into negotiations with the Miccosukee Tribe whereby the Tribe informed the State that the land was important to the Tribe, the State did not actually need the land to achieve the restoration goals, and the State should protect Tribal lands from potential flooding; and

WHEREAS, the State of Florida entered a condemnation lawsuit against the Miccosukee Tribe, which in effect, means the State is condemning the land so the State can acquire it; therefore, be it

RESOLVED that the USET Board of Directors supports the Miccosukee Tribe of Indians of Florida in protecting its Tribal Lands from potential flooding; and, be it further

RESOLVED that the USET Board of Directors calls for the State of Florida to reconsider its position and to enter into further negotiations with the Miccosukee Tribe.
